Beneath Our Feet: Archaeology of the Cambridge Region

This exhibition explores what local archaeological discoveries can tell us about the lives of those who walked this landscape centuries before us. The exhibition includes objects from the Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology's collection, as well as loans from: The British Museum, the Fox family, Girton College, Cambridge, Museum of Cambridge, Peterborough Museum and Art Gallery, Oxford Archaeology, Cambridgeshire County Council and Robert Law.

Material on display includes Neolithic axes, textile fibres from the Bronze Age, a mysterious Roman lead tank which continues to baffle experts, the stunning burial goods of a teenage girl from the early medieval period, evidence of one of Cambridge's medieval friaries, a 17th century Germanic Bellarmine jug (which were often reused as so-called witch bottles) and much more!

WEAG 2023 work at Copped Hall

We initially planned to have three taster weekends this year but we had so much demand we added another, we also had our usual WEAG member's dig which was well attended. The students on our tasters were all very positive about their experience and three have been back as volunteers on other events already.

We had some good results from the archaeology with trenches ZA and ZB both containing evidence of robber trenches ZA also contained a construction cut. Work also continued on trench G where





more garden features were recorded and work was carried out on a large E-W section which has now been drawn. The section also contained some nice finds near its base including a number of clay tobacco pipe bowls and a thimble. We also returned to work on the bank and excavation continued on the small exploratory trenches we opened a few years ago. John Avis took students on the first three Sundays and gave them a talk on geo-physics, those who wanted to and who were appropriately dressed then had a go themselves.



John assures me that he had some good results and we hope to include them in a subsequent edition.

Due to popular demand we decided to run a fourth weekend. Over the weekend the students continued to excavate the trenches on the bank. Malinda Bahram led a session on non-invasive technics. Due to the fact it was open day it was not practical to do any real surveys.

Grace set up the flotation tank and gave a demonstration, the students were the given a chance to have a go themselves. Each of the weekends also contained a brief talk on finds, including pottery.







On the second weekend while Vicky took the students for a tour of the Georgian house, some of use took the opportunity to look at the recent work on the upper

floors attic spaces and as you can see from the photo the new work on the roof.

The Medieval floor tiles at Copt Hall

In June Dr Paul Drury, (renowned medieval buildings expert and excavator of our near neighbour Hill Hall) came to examine the medieval floor tiles that we have found over the last 20 years of work on the site. Below is a brief summary of his findings.

The earliest tiles are probably two decorated Penn tiles, (G132), which presumably relate to work undertaken by Waltham Abbey after they acquired the estate in 1350 (Carlin 2021).



The majority of the tiles are plain Flemish (G160). They are mostly105-110mm square (G160:CH2), but with a smaller numbers of slightly smaller tiles, (95-100 mm) and slightly larger tiles, (118-120mm square) (G160: CH1, 3). All these tiles are glazed either dark mottled green or yellow, but differ in detail. This suggest three separate but linked phases of supply dating to the late 14th or early 15th century.



Later medieval plain glazed tiles are much less well represented in the assemblage. There is one triangular 150mm tile. It is unusually made and fired, with a sporadic white slip under the glaze and has a fine silt fabric which looks Flemish but has no nail holes, as would be expected. Another (snapped) half is from a Flemish tile (G161.CH1, 2) 190-195mm square. There is a single fragment of a large (37mm thick) local brown glazed tile, probably early 16th century (G172).

As we continue our work to reveal the fascinating stories of the objects we have

excavated and the stories they may tell us about our site, it was indeed a pleasure to benefit from the expertise of an internationally recognised academic.


